

- Started in 2022, our annual Listening Tours help us build relationships with neighborhood leaders & grassroots organizations & stay informed on challenges & opportunities for investment across our borough.
- Led by our President & CEO Dr. Jocelynne Rainey & facilitated by BKO partner Lori Luis, we met with community leaders across Brooklyn: businesses owners, educators, parents, faith leaders, nonprofits, & more.

Neighborhood Collective Impact Grants

- Launched in 2024 to address concerns raised during our annual Listening Tours
- To promote neighborhood-level collaborations that advance racial justice and provide resources to BIPOC and historically disempowered communities
- Three projects received \$25,000 each, in Kensington, East New York/Brownsville, and Flatbush/East Flatbush

NEIGHBORHOOD COLLECTIVE IMPACT GRANT

Project: Beyond Memorial

NEIGHBORHOODS

Brownsville, East New York

NONPROFIT PARTNERS

Liminal SP + Brownsville Community Justice Center

PURPOSE

Aims to reclaim public spaces associated with gun violence and community trauma by:

- Incorporating thoughtful solutions such as intentional lighting in place of NYPD light towers that cause sound and light pollution
- Hosting nighttime activations in under-utilized spaces to deter crime
- Incorporating creative-environmental strategies to improve safety conditions at the Rockaway Ave. 3 train station.


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Project Updates: Beyond Memorial

NEIGHBORHOOD COLLECTIVE IMPACT GRANT

- Series of walking tours and art installations highlighting local history and reclaiming spaces associated with violence
- Improving Dr. Green playground, adding in solar lighting to improve visibility and welcome youth in the space
- Teaching local youth commonly played games and interviewing residents familiar with history of space and neighborhood
- A spring event planned for the installation of the lighting and to engage community with the playground's revitalization



NEIGHBORHOOD COLLECTIVE IMPACT GRANT

Project: Cultivate Green

NEIGHBORHOODS

East Flatbush, Flatbush, Flatlands

NONPROFIT PARTNERS

Brooklyn Level Up + Wyckoff House & Association

PURPOSE

Studies found that soil in East Flatbush has the 3rd highest level of lead contamination in NYC, potentially jeopardizing the health of homeowners and community gardeners growing and sharing produce.

Asthma-related hospitalization rates in East Flatbush are higher compared to Brooklyn and NYC overall.

The Cultivate Green project aims to conduct soil testing, air monitoring, and remediation, and host community workshops to raise awareness of health risks, sustainability, and preliminary remediation tactics.

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Project Updates: Cultivate Green

NEIGHBORHOOD COLLECTIVE IMPACT GRANT

- In partnership with Brooklyn College's Urban Soils Lab, youth collected and tested over 200 soil samples from local homes, revealing high levels of lead contamination
- Next, they will teach youth how to build planters and replace contaminated soil
- Community impact map project will visualize soil quality data through a digital map
- Videos that feature homeowners discussing their gardening practices and cultural connections to food growing, capturing the cultural significance of gardening in the neighborhood

Project: Kensington Cultural Council

NONPROFIT PARTNERS

Naturally Occurring Cultural Districts NY, The Singing Winds, Casa Cultural, Bangladesh Institute of Performing Arts, Arts & Democracy, and ArtBuilt

PURPOSE

Aims to coordinate a series of multilingual public cultural events including family arts workshops, sewing circles, dance and ESL classes, storytelling, concerts, and forums reflecting the traditional cultures of immigrant families.

To address a lack of community space, they will conduct a planning process for a local cultural hub that includes office and studio space for local artists and cultural orgs; a large conference room for public workshops, meetings and forums; and storage for shared equipment.

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
Project Updates: Kensington Cultural Council

NEIGHBORHOOD COLLECTIVE IMPACT GRANT

- Cultural programming initiatives, often at the Avenue C Plaza as well as local libraries and schools, with local youth as producers
- Events highlight local cultures, including an Iftar event and a Day of the Dead event
- Working on securing a partnership with the National Endowment for the Arts' program focused on community design and revitalizing vacant storefronts
- Plan to activate a window space for community gatherings and programming





- More people are trying to make this neighborhood a better place to live for all



- Connective public spaces are being reimagined Grand Army Plaza and school blocks



- Great both Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts troops



- At pantries, seniors are showing up regularly, and they can also get pet food for their pets

- Brooklyn Heights waterfront new construction and luxury high rises are activating park spaces



- Walcott Garden each resident has a lot to tend


