Dear Friends and Community,

Brooklyn has always been a place where neighbors look out for neighbors where the bodega owner knows your name, where block parties feel like family reunions, and where our incredible diversity creates strength that cannot be found anywhere else. This is the Brooklyn we champion, and this is the Brooklyn we must protect and nurture together.

In a time of national upheaval, as rising costs threaten to displace longtime residents and cuts to essential services leave our most vulnerable neighbors struggling, we face a choice. We can retreat into ourselves, or we can do what Brooklyn has always done best-turn toward each other with open arms and unwavering solidarity.

Our report's theme, **Brooklyn Backs Brooklyn**, is a call to action and reflects our shared belief: when we invest in each other, we all rise. As Brooklynites, we share an unbreakable bond with our neighbors and the growing knowledge that it is harder for most to make a life here; in our People's Pulse poll, conducted January 2025, nearly half of Brooklynites said they have considered leaving New York City because of the cost of living, and 62% said it is increasingly difficult to afford basic necessities.

This past year, your support helped us take on this critical mission, investing in the essential organizations our neighbors rely on. Brooklyn Org's donor community distributed \$19.5 million to nonprofits, bringing our total to over \$130 million since 2009.

To expand our reach across Brooklyn, in 2024 we launched a new communityled grantmaking process that funded 125 nonprofits working on every issue from housing to jobs to arts and culture—on behalf of families, immigrants, and older adults in every neighborhood. We also expanded our free services and trainings that supported over 500 nonprofits, while our new Neighborhood Collective Impact funding invested in bold local ideas that emerged from our Listening Tours.

As we look ahead, we're reminded that our borough's greatest asset isn't our history—it's our future. Together, we're working to build a Brooklyn for everyone, where opportunity isn't determined by zip code and community solidarity creates solutions to even our greatest challenges.

Brooklyn Org is here to match ideas with resources, challenges with solutions, and inequity with justice. But to achieve long-term change for our communities, we all have a part to play.

Our work is propelled by a deep commitment to racial justice and the critical need to close a significant funding gap: while Brooklyn is the most populated borough, home to one-third of NYC's population and one-third of its nonprofits, we receive only 7.6% of charitable revenue citywide. Moreover, our long-standing communities of color—62% of Brooklyn residents are people of color and 36% were born outside the U.S.—have endured decades of divestment and discrimination, without the adequate resources necessary for our neighbors to thrive.

Since the launch of our strategic plan in 2023, we have been hard at work on two major goals:

- 1. Building the capacity and power of organizations that serve Brooklyn
- 2. Activating and mobilizing greater resources for community impact

In short, we are on a mission to show what is possible when Brooklyn Backs Brooklyn.

This past year has been a flurry of activity to bring that vision to life, and we are excited to have you with us on this new journey. As the saying goes, "nothing about us without us"—and Brooklyn Org involves our community in every step of our critical work for the borough, to help us support hundreds of thousands of Brooklyn families, youth, immigrants, and older adults each year.






Brooklyn Org Volunteer Day

Amplifying Voices Across Brooklyn

Brooklyn Org listens, engages, and partners with Brooklynites across the borough to ensure that we are informed on local issues and investing in community-backed change. In the past year, we've combined public polling with neighborhood conversations and larger community forums to provide a fuller picture of what is most important to Brooklynites in this moment. We also offer opportunities for everyone to be part of local change, through volunteering with our nonprofit partners, thought-provoking events featuring expert panelists, advocacy on boroughwide challenges, and more.

In early 2025, in partnership with the 5BORO Institute, The New York Community Trust, The Staten Island Foundation, and the Altman Foundation, we launched **The People's Pulse, a citywide poll** to determine the most pressing issues facing New Yorkers. Our findings reveal that many are grappling with an affordability crisis, are deeply concerned about public safety, and are increasingly disconnected from the electoral process—yet New Yorkers remain strongly connected to their neighborhoods.

To amplify the barriers to quality of life in Brooklyn that were identified by the poll, we brought together grassroots leaders and local elected officials for our first **community forum**, giving constituents a platform to directly address their representatives in meaningful dialogue, and offer pathways forward beyond the status quo.

We also convened local leaders to build on our 2024 report in partnership with The Center for an Urban Future, 50 Ideas for a Stronger and More Equitable Brooklyn, generating concrete policy solutions that city, state, and borough officials can implement to help communities across Brooklyn thrive.

Strengthening Nonprofits

We are committed to strengthening Brooklyn's nonprofit sector from the ground up, recognizing that meaningful change depends not only on funding, but on the strength, resilience, and leadership of the organizations advancing equity every day.

Since fully launching our free capacity building programming, we have hosted more than 70 workshops, conferences, and leadership salons, engaging **over 1,300 nonprofit professionals from over 500 organizations** across the borough. These gatherings responded directly to the needs of our grantee partners and the wider sector, covering topics from fundraising and board development to narrative strategy and peer support.

Through this work, we support nonprofits in navigating complex operational issues, strengthening leadership, and building the networks they need to grow and thrive. From peer learning to technical assistance, our goal is to ensure that Brooklyn's nonprofit leaders are equipped not only to meet the demands of today, but to shape the future of our borough.

Our Unique Approach

At Brooklyn Org, we believe those closest to the challenges in our communities are closest to the solutions, and we partner with an inclusive, multigenerational Advisory Council to help guide our investment in local nonprofits each year.

Brooklynites apply to join the council for up to two years of service, and once a part of the council, they are compensated to recognize their time and efforts. Working hand in hand with our team by reviewing applications, conducting site visits, and recommending grantees, their lived and professional experience and neighborhood insights ensure our funding is grounded in community.

Listening Tours

Our annual Listening Tours series helps us build relationships with neighborhood leaders and grassroots organizations and stay informed on challenges and opportunities for investment across our borough. From 2022-2024, we held 29 neighborhood conversations with 462 residents across the borough. To support community solutions raised by Brooklynites during our tours, we launched our Neighborhood Collective Impact project funding, which provides \$25,000 to promote collaboration between nonprofits to solve local challenges.

Break Bread With Your Neighbors

Brooklyn is a feast for the senses, with sights, sounds, and flavors to transport you across the globe. What better way to show your love for the borough than with a slice of it—and this recipe offers an opportunity to connect, share, and literally break bread with your neighbors.

Created by Brooklyn Org nonprofit partner **Kindred Bakery BK**, this bread is grounded in the strength and flavor of the borough's diasporic communities. Cassava flour brings softness and resilience to the crumb while a touch of nutmeg evokes the kitchens and histories of African, Caribbean, and Latin American traditions woven into daily life in neighborhoods like Bed-Stuy, Brownsville, Bushwick, Crown Heights, East New York, Flatbush, East Flatbush, Sunset Park, and more. Together, these ingredients form a bread that's both familiar and boldly rooted, and boldly Brooklyn.

ABOUT KINDRED BAKERY BK



Founded by the parents of a young adult with autism, Kindred Bakery BK's inclusive culinary program brings together individuals of all abilities to learn and grow in a supportive environment. Participants engage in hands-on experiences in professional kitchen settings, focusing on baking, social-emotional learning, and STEAM-based activities. The program promotes skill-building, community inclusion, and personal development—empowering each individual to build confidence, foster independence, and actively participate in meaningful community life.

KINDRED OAT + ROOT LOAF

A Nourishing Loaf Grounded In Diasporic Resilience

TIME

Preparation: 30 Minutes

Rise Time: 2 Hours

Baking: 35-50 Minutes

Total: 3-3.5 Hours

YIELD

Total Dough: ~1960g

- 4 × 1 lb. loaves (scale at 490-500g) or
- 2 × 2 lb. loaves (scale at 980-990g)

INGREDIENTS

570ml (2 ½ c. + 2 Tbsp.) Water

100g (7 Tbsp.) Milk Vegan Option: Unsweetened Almond Milk

8g (2 ½ tsp.) Active Dry Yeast—bloom in warm milk or water (from total, warmed to ~75°F)

40g (2 Tbsp.) Honey Vegan Option: Agave Nectar

70g (1/3 c.) Vegetable Oil

150g (1 3/4 c.) Rolled Oats

658g (4 ½ c.) All-Purpose Flour

225g (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ c.) Whole Wheat Flour

40g (5 Tbsp.) Cassava Flour

40g (3 1/4 Tbsp.) Sugar

20g (3 ½ tsp.) Salt

1.2g (1/4 tsp.) Ground Nutmeg

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Bloom Yeast & Soak Oats

Dissolve active dry yeast in warm milk (or a portion of the water) and let sit 5-10 minutes until foamy. Meanwhile, combine oats and the rest of the water and let sit 10 minutes.

2. Mix Dough

Combine all ingredients, including bloomed yeast. Mix on low speed for ~3 minutes, then on medium speed for 3-4 minutes until moderately developed. You want the dough to feel smooth, elastic-ish, and cohesive, but not super tight. It should pull away from the bowl cleanly and feel like it has structure—but no need to overwork it.

3. First Rise

Cover your dough so it doesn't dry out using plastic wrap, a damp towel, or a lidded container. If your space is chilly, stick it in the oven with just the light on, or somewhere around 75-80°F. Let sit and ferment 1 hour.

4. Second Rise

Lightly flour your work surface with enough flour to prevent sticking (but not so much that the dough slides around), and pat the dough into a rectangle about the width of your loaf pan and twice as long. Next, fold the dough once. Folding the dough is like folding a letter: take the top edge and fold it about one third of the way down, fold the bottom third up, and bring the bottom edge up to meet the fold you just made. Then, press gently along the seam with your fingertips or the side of your hand to seal the seam. Cover your dough again and let it rise another hour, or until the dough is aerated and relaxed.

5. Divide & Shape

Divide and measure the dough:

- To make 2 medium loaves, cut into pieces that are 980-990g (2 lb.)
- To make 4 small loaves, cut into pieces that are 490-500g (1lb.)

Shape pieces into logs, then moisten the tops with water using a damp towel or a quick spray with a bottle, and roll in oats.

6. Proof

Proof until nearly doubled or dough passes the fingertip test, where you gently press your floured fingertip into the dough about ½ inch deep:

- If it springs right back, it needs more time
- If it comes back slowly and leaves a little dent, it's ready to go
- If it just stays dented, it's over-proofed

7. Bake

Line your loaf pans with parchment paper, or grease with oil. Score the dough logs lengthwise and place in the pans. Bake at 350°F (177°C):

- 1lb. loaves: 30-35 minutes
- 2 lb. loaves: 45-50 minutes

Bake to an internal temperature of 200-202°F (93-94°C).

8. Share



DEFINITIONS

Unrestricted: Brooklyn Org's team conducts our strategic grantmaking from these assets to support nonprofits that advance racial justice and provide critical resources to communities who have been historically disempowered and discriminated against across our borough. All eligible Brooklyn-serving organizations are invited to apply for general operating support; applications are accepted at any time, and funding decisions are made twice per year in partnership with our Advisory Council of local community members. Funding from these assets also supports Brooklyn Org's general operating costs.

Field of Interest Fund: These funds support specific causes chosen by the donors who established them, with grantmaking directed by the Programs team at Brooklyn Org. Field of Interest funds can be seeded with assets from nonprofits that have ceased operations but are required to transfer their assets to another nonprofit conducting work on particular issues, to maintain the original philanthropic intent of donations.

Classic DAF: All grantmaking from Classic Donor Advised Funds is made through grant recommendations from their Donor Advisors (we also refer to these individuals as "fund holders" at Brooklyn Org). These assets are considered unrestricted, since they are not dedicated to a particular purpose upon creation, and grantmaking decisions lie in the hands of the individual fund holders, as opposed to Brooklyn Org.

Corporate Advised Fund: We frequently work with businesses to develop well-rounded corporate giving programs, including matching gift programs, through these funds to support causes that are important to companies and their employees.

Scholarship Fund: Similar to a Classic DAF, all grantmaking from Scholarship Funds is made through grant recommendations from their Donor Advisors. We leave it to the Donor Advisors to determine how they set up and manage any scholarship applications and criteria they may have; our team simply makes their grants once they decide on the recipients.

Nonprofit Fund: Sometimes called a "Nonprofit Agency Fund," these allow an organization to focus on its mission, rather than spend time identifying and supervising investment managers. These funds are ideal for nonprofits looking to set up an account for long-term invested assets, separate from their daily operating expenses. It can also help a nonprofit with gift planning and endowment-building to ensure its long-term financial sustainability.

Giving Circle: Giving Circles allow a group of donors with shared interests to combine their resources as a group to make highimpact grants to the nonprofits and causes they care most about. Like the charitable version of a book club, how you organize your goals and your group's structure is up to you.

Independently Managed DAF: Allows you to open a charitable fund with a minimum initial gift of \$1M, while continuing to receive support from your personal wealth advisor to manage and grow the fund's assets. This option combines the flexibility and personalized investment strategies of your advisor with Brooklyn Org's philanthropic expertise to ensure your giving has the greatest possible impact.
